This work examines the factors that shape and influence home-school relations. At its heart is an analysis of parent-teacher relationships in an inner city borough, drawn from case studies of five primary schools and a parents' centre. Interviews with parents are revealing windows into parents' views on a range of issues, including curriculum, discipline and parents' relationships with their children's teachers.; The author also considers teachers' perspectives on these matters, and explores the influence of social class, ethnicity and gender on parent-teacher interactions. While presenting these issues within a consideration of broader themes such as citizenship, community, power and participation, the book discusses the reasons why initiatives designed to improve home- school relations appear to result in such limited change. Parental involvement is associated with students' educational achievement (Ahmad, 2010; Theodorou, 2008; Yanghee, 2009). Although parent involvement is linked to student success, schools frequently fail to establish a strong connection between home and school (Ahmad, 2010; Bourdieu, 1973; Brint, 2011), particularly in urban areas (Epstein & Sanders, 2006). Thus, a descriptive case study was used to examine the ideologies of both teachers and parents regarding the quality of their interrelationships with respect to how they both care for their children. Three varied data sets were used: (a) open-ended interviews, (b) field notes, and (c) a focus group. The data from the three sources were analyzed and coded using MAXQDA data analysis software. Results indicated that both teachers and parents prioritize communication and sharing information as two main strategies to improve engagement and optimize children's academic results. Additionally, results indicated that both groups expressed the hope that parental involvement in their children's educations would lead to better parent-teacher relationships and the children's continued motivation for learning. Further, results indicated four major social and cultural factors that influence the relationships between families and schools: attitudes and beliefs, unwelcome feelings due to a new school policy, gaps in home-school communication, and a lack of trust in special services. Moreover, creating a welcoming environment, improving home-school communication, and establishing early collaboration emerged as significant requirements for healthy parent-teacher relationships. The MetLife Survey of The American Teacher (2004-2005) reported the greatest challenge new teachers face is communicating with parents. Their research also indicated it was the area in which new teachers were the least prepared. This book provides a literature review, which covers research dating back nearly 30 years on practices veteran teachers and practitioners used for improving parent-teacher communication.
