Almost all the figures are taken from the memoir by Sars, in Erichson's Arch., 1 B. 1 H. tab. i--iv, some from a work by the same author, entitled 'Beskrivelser og lagttagelser over nogle markelige eller nye i Havet ved den Bergenske Kyst levende Dgr, o. s. v.,' (Bergen, 1835.) Figs. 1--19 represent especially the progeny of *Cyanea capillata*, but according to Sars it corresponds so perfectly with that of *Medusa aurita*, that in most cases it is impossible to distinguish the one from the other. Fig. 35-40 only are from my original drawings, made in my Icelandic journey. Figs. 1-19. Show the development of the first generation, which I have named Medusa-nurses. Figs. 1-4.
