*(Re)Constructing Memory: Education, Identity, and Conflict* Sep 01 2020 How do schools protect young people and call on the youngest citizens to respond to violent conflict and division operating outside, and sometimes within, school walls? What kinds of curricular representations of conflict contribute to the construction of national identity, and what kinds of encounters challenge presumed boundaries between us and them? **History, Memory, and Trans-European Identity** Feb 16 2022 This book questions the presupposition voiced by many historians and
